As young people define who they are and where they belong, they are also forming their sexual and gender identities. As a caregiver, you have an important role in providing a safe space where they can explore their identities and express themselves. You don't have to know everything about gender or sexual identity terms to create a loving, positive environment.



## HELP YOUNG PEOPLE FEEL SAFE AND WELCOME

- ☐ Support and accept young people in developing their identities.
- Don't make assumptions about a young person's gender or sexual identity
- □ Recognize that how teens understand and express their identities may change over time.
- Provide access to media with positive representations of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer or questioning (LGBTQ+) characters and storylines
- ☐ Help young people connect with LGBTQ+ resources in the community
- ☐ Share positive, empowering messages about sexuality

## Get to know a young person without making assumptions about them

- ☐ "How should I refer to you? I'm [name] and my pronouns are..."
- ☐ "Who are the important people in your life?"
- ☐ "What are your favorite TV shows right now? Which characters do you like best?"

<u>Parents</u>, <u>Families</u>, <u>and Friends of Lesbians and Gays</u> (PFLAG) is a national organization with local chapters across the country. This community support group builds awareness, knowledge, and skills around accepting and appreciating the LGBTQ+ people in your life.
